MIDWAY CHAPEL CHURCH HISTORY

Midway Chapel was located in Jefferson County, Kansas, on a one-acre parcel at the northeast corner of what is now known as the intersection of Marion and 62nd. The church lot was acquired on September 19, 1893 from Israel S. Owen. The building was 28 X 40 with a 17-foot ceiling and reported nearing completion in late September 1893. The name "Midway" was chosen as the church was midway between Oskaloosa and Perry. Midway is also a very popular town name, there being 39 in the U. S, according to an internet search. Jefferson County had a village/Post Office named Middletown that existed from 1857 to 1860. It was located about one mile northeast of present-day city of McLouth.

Midway Chapel was a congregation of The Church of United Brethren in Christ, The denomination was organized in 1800 by Martin Böhme and Philip William Otterbein and is the first American denomination that was not transplanted from Europe. It emerged from United Brethren churches that were at first unorganized. In 1889 a controversy over membership in secret societies such as Freemasons, split the denomination, but both blocs continued to use the same name. The majority faction merged with the Evangelical Church in 1946 to become a new denomination, Evangelical United Brethren (E.U.B.). This in turn merged in 1968 with the Methodist church to become the United Methodist church. The minority faction of the 1889 split still exists today and is based in Huntington, Indiana. However, we have none located in Jefferson County.

Jefferson County was blessed to have about 17 rural churches meeting the religious needs of the the rural areas in the first 100 years of its history. The three with an asterisk were all of the denomination of United Brethren in Christ. The numbers in parenthesis are the Section, Township and Range in which each church was located.

In 1937, the Kansas Conference of the United Brethren in Conference sold the land back to Israel Owen. The church building ownership was retained by the church with the stipulation that the building would be removed. This leads me to believe the church building was to be relocated intact to some other property. However, I have not been able to determine such a placement.

I. S. Owen & wife to Board of Trustees of **Midway Chapel**. This indenture made this 19th day of Sept. **1893**, between I. S. Owen and Laura Owen, his wife, of Jefferson County in the state of Kansas of the first part and the Board of Trustees of Midway chapel and their successors in office in trust for the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, of Jefferson County, in the state of Kansas, of the second part, that said parties of the first part, in consideration of the sum of twenty dollars, the receipt whereof is hereby acknowledged do by these presents grant, bargain, sell and convey unto said parties of the second part their heirs, assigns, all the following described real estate, situated in the county of Jefferson and state of Kansas to wit: Commencing at the southwest corner of the southwest one-fourth, of section number twenty-four (24), township ten (10), range eighteen (18), running thence East, two hundred ten (210) feet, thence North one hundred ninety five (195), thence west two hundred ten (210) feet, thence South one hundred ninety five (195) feet, to place of beginning, containing one acre, more or less.

To have and to hold the same together with all and singular the tenements, hereditaments and appurtenances there unto belonging or in anywise appertaining, forever.

And said I. S. Owen and wife Laura Owen, his wife, for themselves, their heirs, executors or administrators, do hereby promise, covenant and agree, to and with said party of the second part, that at the delivery of these presents lawfully seized in their own right, of an absolute and indefeasible estate of inheritance, in fee simple, of and in and singular the above granted and described premises, with the appurtenances that the same are free, clear, discharged and unencumbered of and from all former and other grants, titles, charges, estates judgements, taxes, assessments, and encumbrances, of what nature or kind so ever it is hereby agreed a tract of land _____ said _____ for church purposes or the purposes named in the charter for the Midway Chapel these to _____ to the original owner, his heirs, or assigns and that they will warrant and forever defend the same unto said party of the second part, their heirs and assigns, against said party of the first part, their heirs, and all and person, or persons, whomsoever, lawfully claiming or to claim the same.

In witness Whereof, the said party of the first part have hereunto set their hand on the day and year first above written.

The church on the I. S. Owen's farm between here and Perry is almost completed, except the inside finishing. Jacob Steffey and Thos. Riggs are doing the work, with such assistance as is donated. The building is 28 X 40 with 17-foot ceilings.

Board of Trustees of U. B. Church to I. S. Owen

This indenture made this 30th day of April in the year of our Lord one thousand nine hundred thirty seven between The Board of Trustees of Kansas Conference of United Brethren in Christ of Topeka, in the county of Shawnee, state of Kansas, of the first part and I. S. Owen, of the second part. Witnessed that said party of the first part for and consideration of the sum of one dollar and other good and valuable consideration to it duly paid, has sold unto the party of the second party, his heirs and assigns forever, all that tract, or parcel of land situated in the county of Jefferson, and state of Kansas described as follows: beginning at the southwest corner of the southwest one fourth of section twenty four, township ten, range eighteen, Oskaloosa township, Jefferson County, Kansas, running two hundred ten feet east thence one hundred ninety five feet north, thence two hundred ten feet west, thence one hundred ninety five feet south to place of beginning containing about one acre.

The GRANTOR herein makes specific reservation unto itself in this deed all buildings and improvements on said realty capable of removal, and does now reserve the right to enter upon the aforesaid premises at any time for the purpose of removing there from the Church building located thereon, and such other removable property belonging to Grantor.

Grantors do now hereby agree that they will remove the buildings and property located on said premises aforesaid as soon as permitted to do so by the District Court of Jefferson County, Kansas.

Grant for removal of property from I. S. Owen and wife to Trustees of U. B. Church, state of Kansas, Jefferson County SS. Filed for record, **May 7, A.D. 1937** at 11:15 a.m.

Know all men by these presents that the undersigned I. S. Owen and Laura Owen, his wife, parties of the first part, of Jefferson County, Kansas, do by these presents grant, bargain, sell, assign and transfer to: The Board of Trustees of the Kansas Conference of the Church of the United Brethren in Christ, parties of the second part, all their right title and interest in the following described property to wit: **The church building and removable property** located on the following described property in Jefferson County, Kansas, beginning at the southwest corner of the southwest one fourth of section twenty four, township ten, range eighteen, Oskaloosa township, Jefferson County, Kansas, running two hundred ten feet east thence one hundred ninety five feet north, thence two hundred ten feet west, thence one hundred ninety five feet south to place of beginning containing about one acre.

Said grand and sale of said church building and removable property being made for the consideration of a quit claim deed from second parties conveying the aforesaid realty, with the exception of the church building and removable property. Second parties are given the right to enter upon said land and **remove said church building**. Parties of the second part fully agrees to remove the aforesaid buildings and just as soon as permitted by the District Court of Jefferson County, Kansas. I. S. Owen, Laura Owen

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(#6) *The Oskaloosa Independent*, Aug. 8., 1946, page 3, col. 3

Pioneer farm sold. Mr. and Mrs. I. S. Owen have sold their farm home at Midway Chapel, seven miles southwest of Oskaloosa to Robt. Auburn of Hays, Kansas, who will get possession about first of October. The Owens will make visits with children in scattered places before taking up permanent residence.

Mr. Owen [not "Owens"] has resided on this place for 79 years, did his own farming 65 years. His farm was on the old wagon road between Oskaloosa and Perry, which was a regular hack route; and the old Oregon postoffice was at the Owen place. It being midpoint between towns named, the United Brethren chapel erected there in an early day was named Midway. The Owen farm is the last on the old hack route to pass from pioneer hands.

Civil War Diary of John Steuart, Part III, 1865

The transcribed diary below is the third installment of John Steuart's Civil War writings. The diary was shared with the Jefferson County Genealogical Society by the Curry and Steuart families.

July 21st (1865) – Got to Little York against 3 ½ o'clock broke the engine five miles from Harrisburg.

22nd – Got Williamsburg a beautiful little town of one thousand inhabitants, four churches, one large hotel not finished, mountains on the west about 200 feet high got to Almira at sun set and was put in number one barracks got a fine supper seven miles from the state line.

July Sunday 23, 1865 – Lay up in the barracks some of the boys went to church.

24th – We relieved the regulars fifteen of our company got passes I with the rest thru the city Elmira it is a pretty place of about 12 thousand population several churches and other fine buildings no end to saloons.

25th July 1865 – The regulars left Elmira barracks at three o'clock our Co. moved into their quarters I was on guard there is seven Indians in camp belonging to the 104 New York there was a State gent round to see to patrolled prisoners and prisoners that had not got their pay yet.

28th – I was on guard at the gate.

August 3rd 1865 – The 22nd New York Cavalry came in for supper then to Rochester to be mustered out of service.

August 5th – Joseph Temple and I went out to east Port p.m. went to the huckleberry

patch after supper a squad of us went to the Susquehanna River.

7th – I was on guard number 5 third relief.

7th – Drummed a citizen out of camp for cursing and profaning our late President.

8th – I was out gathering huckleberries with one of my company I gathered about four quarts got in before ?

9th – Scrubbed our quarters – wrote a letter.

12th – I was at church for service and at night in the Methodist church.

13th – I was on guard at the Hospital ?

15th – The 2nd N.Y. Regt. And 15th Cavalry consolidated came in to be payed off – I went aberrying forenoon.

20th – The hospital No. 2 moved to No. 3. I was on guard at the building and garden.

Moved to No. 3 28th

Aug. 31st – I was mustered for pay with the invalids.

Sept. 2nd – I got letters from home – answered one was doing police duty.

Got a letter from home stating that my money had not reached home I went to the express office but could hearing nothing of it then I wrote home for them to inquire if it was not at the nearest office for the U.S. Express Co.

Sept. 12th – Cos. A & B joined us at Barracks No. 3 and a small squad of invalids came the previous evening.

15th – Jos. Temple wrote a letter to

16th – I received a letter from Samuel Myardoss to have inspection and dress parade at four o'clock Sunday 16th, 1865 I was detailed to help ?

20th ?

Oct. 2 – I was up at the Camp got some sullscap paper and other necessarys that I needed.

13th – Very cold some talk of getting payed off flying reports about getting mustered out of service.

Oct. 15th – Six nights to writing School in the Comercial Coledge.

Oct. 18th 1865 – Our Regt. Got payed from government 1,165.90.

20th – Went to town, 2 pair socks, song book, ? pocket knife, hair oil.

30th – Going to town get one box blacking, one bottle olive oil, one box ? one paper stove black.

31st – The 1st Vet Reserve Corps. Got very to be mustered out the 2nd Vet to be mustered for pay Cloudy and rainy.

Nov. 5 – Sunday cloudy & rainy in the morning snowing some P.M. cold and increasing at night and me lying hunkadodle in my bunk thinking of my friends at home and the Joys when I was a boy with my Mother.

Nov. 15th, 1865 – The old guard house and the headquarters got burnt by the stove pipe.

Nov. 16th – I wrote a long letter – got one prisoner let him go by orders.

Nov. 18th 1865 – Co. A left Elmira at 6 o'clock for New Haven, Connecticut.

19th – Arrived in Jersey City by daylight crost the Hudson River and marched to the Barracks near castle Gardens where we got breakfast and diner then marched to the city park I took the street cars to 7th St.

Nov. 19th – At the New Haven depot got on the cars and started at 5 o'clock p.m. and landed in New Haven at 8 ½ o'clock and marched to the Fair Havin Barrack where we found one Co. and the 5th Regt.

20th – Went up town and got breakfast came back and moved our traps in other barracks P.M. three of us went up town then to the ship landing then back then we took the st cars and went to West Vill fare 6 cts seen the Capital and numerous other publick buildings two nice little mountains there was some mistake in the order the Capton went to Hartford, Conn. We could not draw any rations.

21st – Very wet went up town and got diner price 75th cts came back tooook a tramp threw Fair Haven.

22nd – Co. A had inspection at three o'clock P.M. the 2nd Regt. Company at dusk nothing new transpired C C C I made a cover for my gun of Indian rubber. Jno Steuart

Nov. 23, 1865 – Colin and I went to West Vill went up to the top of west rock then to the Hamilton Park where the race horse is I got an oyster super at John ? got to Camp at dusk.

Nov. 24 1865 – I was detailed for guard the first since the 28th of August 1865 posted at the gate and one private room.

Sat. 25, 1865 – Joseph Cathcart and I took a walk up town and got two pair drawers each fore noon I had Co. inspection at 4 o'clock p.m. then I went up town and had a good bath.

Sun. 26th, 1865 – Had Co. inspection after guard ? p.m. Three of us crost Fair Haven Bridge to camp and had Co. inspection at 4 o'clock p.m.

Monday 27th 1865 – Went to town and got a Corps Badge engraved.

Monday 27th, 1865 – Went to the Rope baloon ascension Town (?) House it is 88 ft high 55 in diameter 165 in circumference the ?

Tues. 28th, 1865 – We had one hour drill after guard then Mathews and I took a long walk to the lighthouse six miles distant was up to the top and had a good view of West Haven ? New Haven & Fair Haven, East

Haven, East and West Rock got a fine dinner at ? House. I got home at half past three o'clock.

Wed 29th, 1865 I was on guard at the hospital while on post I seen the Baloon House, New Haven, I watched it till it was just a black spot in the sky the rope asension was three dolars seventy-five for a voyage ?

Nov. 30th Co. A of the fifth got marching orders but did not get off til the 4 o'clock train I went down town P.M. and got my boots half soled price one dolar and quarter, we drew straw beds our company all alone at this post.

Dec. 1, 1865 Nothing of note took place till Christmas Colin & I went to New Haven and got a fine diner of turkey in a dining Saloon – I had a fine oyster [pages lost from book].

1866 Bought team harness wagon for four hundred forty seven dolars and a half. 447.50. For feed, twenty two dollars and ninety five cts

Mash the potatoes with the cream, when cool, add the butter and sugar, beat to a cream, then add the eggs and other ingredients. Bake in a rich puff paste.

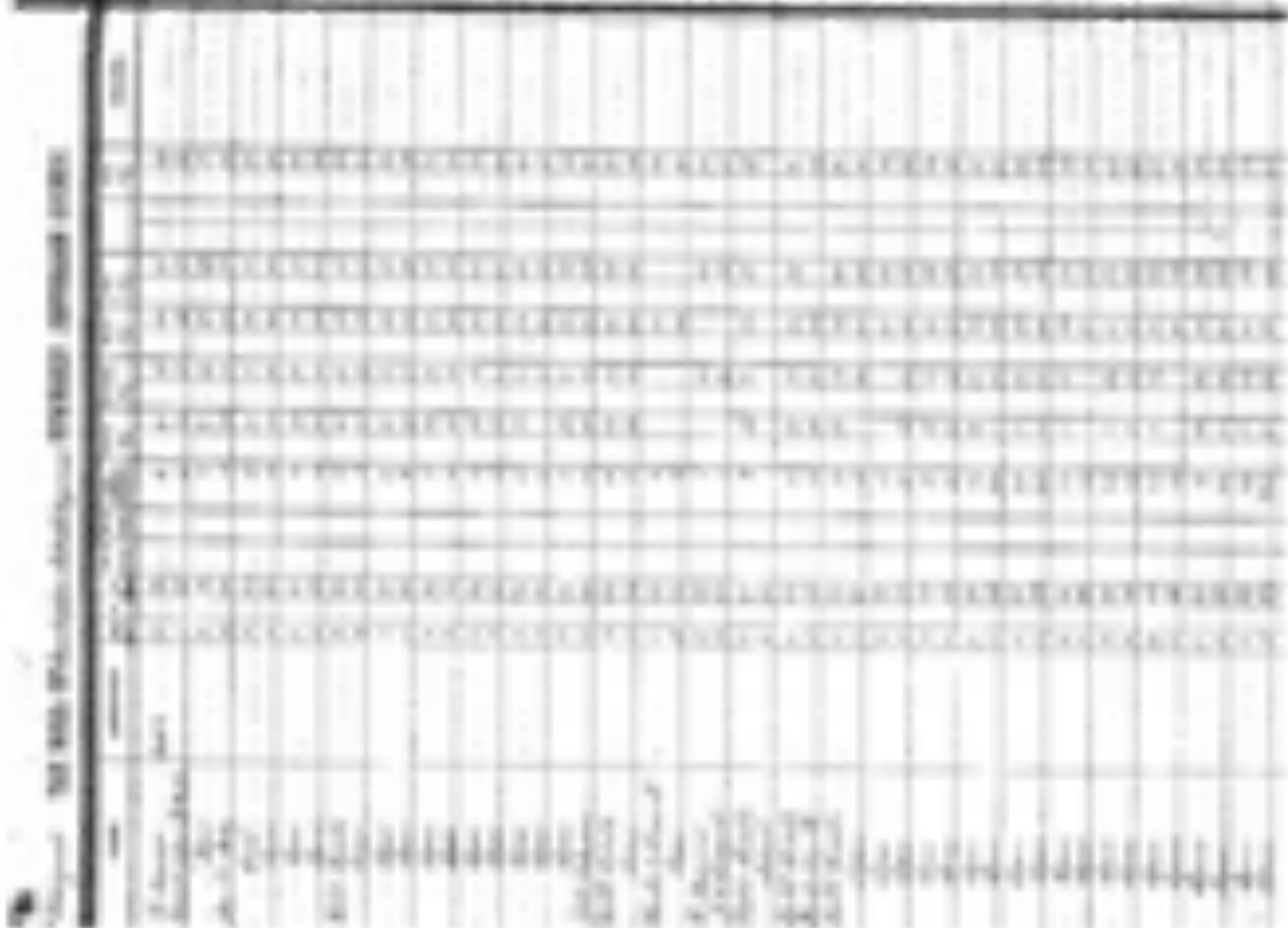
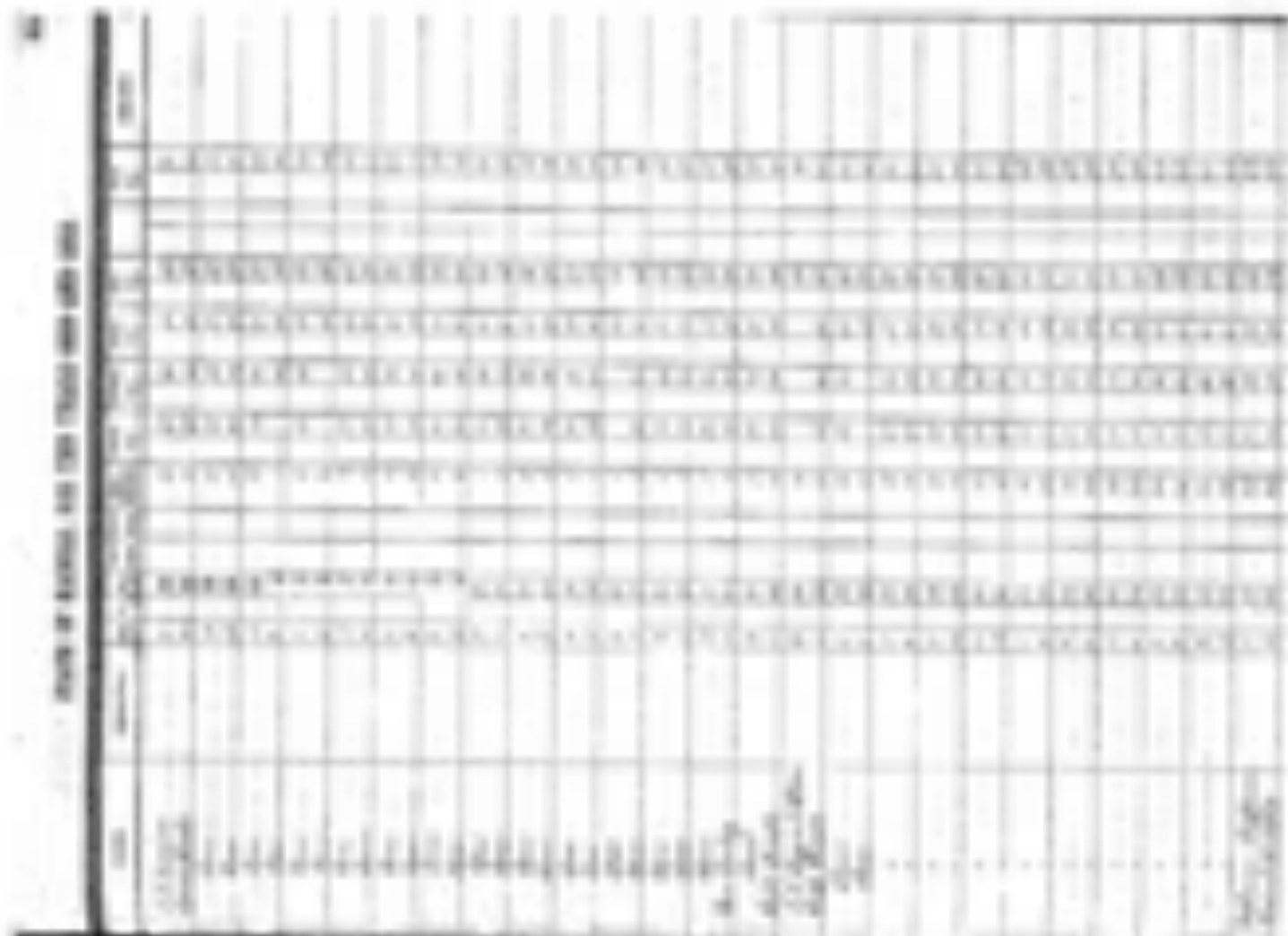
